Dear Parents and Guardians,

Our next Social Studies Unit, "Ways of Living," focuses on different cultures and their customs and traditions. In class, we will study the traditions of different cultural groups in our country and learn about how culture is taught and passed on. The unit also emphasizes that the United Sates is a diverse nation of immigrants who came from "somewhere" else originally. In our school, we celebrate how we are united through our faith and are part of the family of Christ, but it is also important to celebrate our cultural diversity.

As part of this unit study, I am asking students to complete a family "cultural interview", which they will then orally present to their classmates. This project will connect students' real-life experience with ideas that we are studying in Social Studies and allow students to learn from each other rather than just from the textbook. Please read the project description with them, help them complete their family interview at home, practice their oral presentation of the interview, and complete a culture collage to show in class during their presentation. They may choose to bring in an "artifact" (see Cultural Project Guidelines for more details) from your culture to show in class to compliment the collage and oral presentation. Cultural Project Guidelines and Due Dates



Family Interview (due Friday, March 15):

Students should interview a family member. They must record the family member's answers in writing on the Family Interview Worksheet.

Cultural Collage (due Monday, March 25):


Each student will create a 18" by 22" collage. This collage may focus on one custom your child will present <u>or</u> it may show a snapshot of many customs in your culture. However, the oral presentation will focus only on one custom. The collage can be created by a combination of the following: magazine cut outs, family photos, words, hand drawings, sayings or quotes common in your family custom, etc. Be creative! You may use any kind of art medium to create this collage (ie. crayons, markers, glitter, pens, paint...). Examples are attached.

Oral Presentation (Monday, April 1st):

Using information learned from their interview, students will present to their classmates what culture(s) their ancestors or family are from, and <u>explain one custom or tradition from their culture in detail</u>. They may use notecards and should not read off a piece of paper while presenting. Please have them practice their oral presentation at home before presenting in class!

Artifact (optional, bring on Monday, April 1st for presentation):

Something that represents your culture and customs or traditions. Students will bring it to share with the class along with their cultural collage on their presentation day. It could be a piece of clothing, another object, a song on a CD, food (as long as it doesn't contain peanuts or tree nuts)...it's totally up to you!
