Thank you so much for purchasing my Stone Soup unit! This is my very favorite story to do in the fall/winter. It is usually our first folktale of the year and I love how it comes in so many different forms. I read several versions of this story. We compare and contrast the stories, talk about how the main lesson is the same in each story, and how the story reflects the culture that it comes from.

At the end of the unit we send home our request note (included) and ask students to bring in a canned or frozen veggie to add to our soup (raw veggies do not cook enough in a crock pot unless you precook them some). We mix all of our veggies together with chicken broth, and some spices and of course a stone (yes, a real stone, I wash it in the dishwasher) and throw it in the crockpot and cook it all day. At the end of the day we eat our soup and complete the writing activities to go with the cooking. It is always something my students remember at the end of the year. I think it really helps build our classroom bonds and it a great unit to use near the holidays as the lists of wants start to grow. It shows students that sharing and giving makes us all better.




Put all the ingredients in a LARGE crockpot or two on high all day! At the end of the day I always add some butter for extra flavor.


Dear Parents,






